### **Composting**

Presented by Chris Chitambar, a physician, medical educator and cancer researcher. He has been a passionate life-long gardener and became a certified Master Gardener following his retirement from the Medical College of Wisconsin 4 years ago. As a Master Gardener, he volunteers his time regularly in the Master Gardener teaching program, working in the gardens at Boerner Botanical Gardens, and assisting in the Friends of Boerner Botanical Gardens education programs. He is also on the Board of Directors of the Friends of Boerner Botanical Gardens.

IF there is time, following this presentation, Deb Ciszewski, Chapter Director, Master Gardener and Master Naturalist, will show and discuss her worm compost bin and talk about the benefits, ease and joy of worm composting. If we run out of time, this can be a future topic.

Compare decomposition of a banana in a compost vs landfill. GPT says:



#### **In a Compost Pile**

- Time: Around 3 to 4 weeks (sometimes up to 2 months in cool or dry conditions).
- Why: Composting provides oxygen, microbes, and often heat, which break down organic matter quickly.

- The banana peel softens within days and is usually unrecognizable after a few weeks.
- The nutrients return to the soil as humus, enriching it.



### **In a Landfill**

- Time: Up to 20–30 years, sometimes longer.
- Why: Landfills are anaerobic (low oxygen), compacted, and dry — not ideal for decomposition.
- Even food waste can mummify instead of decompose properly.
- Studies of excavated landfill cores have found intact banana peels, hot dogs, and newspapers decades old.

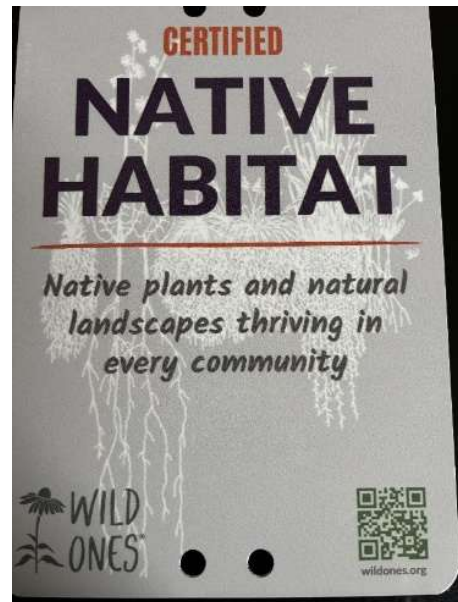
